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VDDHH PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Virginia Relay

- A free public service, Virginia Relay enables people who are deaf, hard of hearing, deafblind, or speech disabled to communicate with standard telephone users
- The telephone conversation is relayed between the two users by a specially trained Virginia Relay Communications Assistant (CA)
- Available 24 hours/day, 7 days/week, 365 days/year

Technology Assistance Program (TAP)

- The Technology Assistance Program (TAP) provides telecommunication equipment to qualified applicants whose disabilities prevent them from using a standard telephone
- Demonstrates TAP equipment options, provides training on how to use the equipment, and troubleshoots equipment issues
- Provides information about specialized telecommunication equipment and assistive technology

Interpreting Services Program (ISP)

- Maintains a Directory of Qualified Interpreters
- Coordinates sign language interpreter and CART services for state agencies and Virginia courts
- Oversees service agreements with qualified interpreters and CART providers to provide services
- Provides information about sign language interpreters and real-time captioning

Virginia Quality Assurance Screening

- Administers the Virginia Quality Assurance Screening (VQAS) and provides assessments to interpreters on their skills
- Administers the Educational Interpreter Performance Assessment (EIPA)

Community Services

- Responds to requests for information and provides referrals on various topics related to hearing loss
- Provides training to government agencies, public safety officials, and professionals that serve persons who have a hearing loss
- Provides technical assistance to organizations regarding reasonable accommodations and effective communication
- Promotes public awareness about hearing loss
